The Imaginary Invalid was written in 1672 and was the last play by Moliere, a writer and actor who found favour with the French aristocracy, including at the court of King Louis XIV. The play deals with the subject of hypochondria and was intended as a biting satire of the medical profession in an era when medicine was still in its infancy. Although huge advancements have been made in that field in the several hundred years since the play was penned, the subject matter remains of relevance today, for the human body and mind still contain many mysteries into which physicians and pharmacists have limited insight. Although effective at treating broken bones or infectious disease, medicine can not always treat the variety of conditions which hint at a disruption within the very core of the human being. It is from the angle of mental health therefore that I have chosen to look at this play, for Mr Argan, our enema addicted, delusional, hypochondriac exhibits all the symptoms of somebody who has suffered a break down due to stress. Unable to cope with reality, he surrounds himself with unscrupulous people who are only too happy to 'treat' his imaginary illness, enriching themselves at the same time. Argan's salvation is offered in the form of love which can help him re-balance his life, but in order to benefit from it he must first face up to his own fragilities and stop running from the truth.

Moliere's original play contained an opera and ballet to break up the acts, an endeavour that would have stretched our resources somewhat considerably and so instead we decided to film an amusing three minute pop video for your delectation. Quite what the great man would have thought of this, or of my adaptation which now takes place entirely within the malfunctioning imagination of a self medicating, depressive we will never know, for he died on stage playing Argan in the fourth performance of the play.

Hopefully none of the actors will die on stage this evening, either literally or metaphorically, and hopefully you will find the play as funny as we have done during rehearsals.

Finally, we live in a an era in which it is predicted that one in four of us will suffer from mental illness at some stage in our lives. I would suggest that it is worth asking why this is, what sort of society have we produced that makes people so ill, and if there isn't there a better approach than our current over-reliance on pharmaceuticals.

But don't worry, we're not going to get all heavy and try to lecture you, because our play, like life itself, is really all just a silly farce.

Enjoy the show.
