Before the usual cast and sketch lists here is a brief note from one of our members about her late father, who is responsible for the five fantastic poems being presented in the show tonight.

"My father, Ian Smith, sadly passed away in August 2018. Yorkshire born and bred, he studied and trained to be an Architect and eventually settled in Warrington to develop the New Town (a large part of which was designed by him). In his later years he became involved in a new project at the site of the Fairfield and Howley Primary School which had been closed down (and as a coincidence my mother attended as a child). Over ten years, he successfully set up and ran a community led project - The Old School - which grew from strength to strength. At his funeral, many attended to bid farewell to this pillar of the community and remarked The Old School would never be the same without him. They have a Facebook page so please feel free to look it up and the great work they continue to do.

"Ian was an artist, a community activist, a socialist and a prolific poet. He was a big promoter of the arts, being my biggest fan and coming to see every Chorlton Players production I performed in. Following his death, I collated hundreds of his poems in a bid to create an anthology. I have selected 5 of his poems to be performed tonight. I hope you enjoy them.
